Hello parents and carers,

Our NT Learning Commission group recently participated in an event at Rosebery Secondary School, where they collaborated with student leaders from other schools across Palmerston and Darwin. The day was spent engaging with various data sets and strengthening this group's understanding about how they can support our school to keep improving.

In the early weeks of this term, Bakewell teachers have been undertaking several activities that involve discussing data

and assessing student learning. Transition and Preschool teachers have spent time analysing foundational literacy skills data, which has helped to inform focus teaching points in Transition and Preschool, as well as the tailoring of activities for individual students in Transition. Of these foundational skills, the one that our Transition students are the best at is identifying the sound that letters make.

The one that is currently the hardest for our Transition students is identifying the name of the letters. Mrs Tanya Lohse recently led teachers through a session to reflect upon recent literacy data for their students, to help form intervention programs for students who are not learning as well as we would like them to.

In another session that Bakewell teachers participated in last week, Mrs Lohse led teachers to analyse and assess student writing. Interventions and Writing are two of our 2026 key actions and both of these recent activities saw teachers working together to progress our work involved with ensuring that all students are learning well, as well as improving the teaching of Writing.

Still on data and assessment, teachers are currently very busy developing the semesterly individual student reports, which will go home later in the term. Extensive work goes into the development of these reports, which ultimately provide parents with information about their child's level of achievement and their effort for each learning area, as well as comments from the teacher that provide fuller details and context.

In some exciting news for upper primary students... this week we have opened the oval for playtimes! We are hoping that our older students will enjoy and benefit from the opportunity to have a more expansive space for their ball games and running around.

Lastly, there are several exciting events that have either happened recently or are happening currently! We had an excellent ANZAC Day assembly on the 24<sup>th</sup> – all of our students were very respectful throughout this ceremony and were very well prepared about the significance of ANZAC Day by their teachers in the lead up. Our year three and year four students are in the midst of their swimming lessons – our first cohort to do this in 2026 so far. This week, our Mothers' Day stall is happening, and classes have allocated opportunities to attend for students to purchase something – check Seesaw and Facebook for the day that your child's class will be attending!

## Transition Buchanan - Transition/1 Collins - Transition Rosa

Can you believe our Transition/Year 1 students have already been at school for 62 days? We are now counting down to the exciting milestone of 100 days at school later in the year!

The past 14 weeks have flown by and have been filled with rich and engaging learning opportunities across all of our classrooms. Part of a daily routines for Literacy and Numeracy are Daily Reviews, where students revisit previously taught knowledge and skills. This important routine helps to strengthen memory and build confidence, as students practise and consolidate their learning through a range of active participation strategies, including choral responses, partner talk, and writing on whiteboards.

Each morning, students participate in our Literacy Block, where the focus is on phonics, reading, and learning to write. In Mathematics, we have been exploring counting, matching collections of objects, subitising, and measurement, building strong early number concepts.

A highlight from this term so far is our annual Teddy Bears Picnic with Preschool. A Block students loved the opportunity to connect, play, and be role models for the new preschoolers to Bakewell. There is a real buzz in A Block as students continue to develop the foundational skills, routines, and confidence they need to thrive at school.

## Mobile Phones & E-Scooters

### Mobile Phones and Smart Watches

The NT Department of Education and Training does not permit students to have mobile phones or personal digital devices (including smart watches) during the school day. Bakewell Primary School's Mobile Phones and Smart Watches Policy reinforces this NT-wide directive, including stating that:

- Student mobile phones and smart watches should be left at home.
- Students and parents should use normal school communication channels (e.g. the front office phone) for any parent-student contact.
- If students do bring their mobile phone to school,
  - a) they are not permitted to use their mobile phone or smart watch before or after school.
  - b) they must be placed in classroom message bags upon entering the classroom, for their safe storage at the front office for the day.

### E-Scooters


Northern Territory law states that if people own their own e-scooter, they can only ride it on private property, and they cannot ride them on roads, footpaths, or other public spaces. To that end, Bakewell Primary School students will no longer be allowed to bring e scooters to school, and these scooters will not be allowed to be stored in school bike racks. As a primary school, we need to be encouraging safe and legal modes of transportation to and from school.

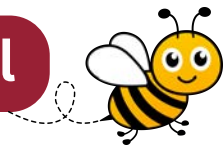
Our next steps are to analyse the data collected from across the school and decide on key focus areas to support continued improvement at Bakewell.

### **Colour Fun Run – Week 10**

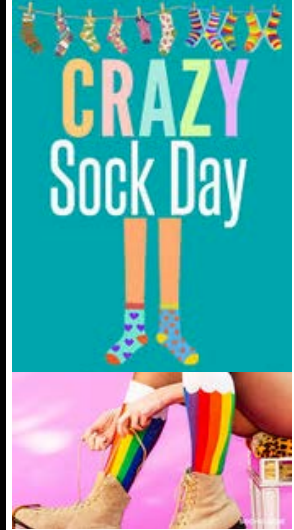

## Children's Online Privacy Code

Protecting your personal information online is one important step to protecting your online privacy.

The Office of the Australian Information Commissioner (OAIC) is the Australian Government's privacy regulator, and our goal is to protect the privacy of Australians. We are responsible for writing the Children's Online Privacy Code. When we refer to 'children' and 'young people' we mean individuals under the age of 18.

The Children's Online Privacy Code (the Code) puts children and young people at the centre of online privacy protections in Australia. This new Code will help protect children's online privacy by telling many online services, like apps, games, and websites, how they need to follow special privacy rules when taking care of children's personal information online.

Tell us what you think of the draft Code! From 31 March to 5 June 2025 we want to hear from children, young people, parents and carers. Have your say about the draft Code by heading to [oaic.gov.au/privacyforkids](http://oaic.gov.au/privacyforkids) or scan the QR code.

### The rules in the draft Code

<b>Rule 1</b> Many online services will need to follow the rules in the Code	<b>Rule 2</b> To protect your personal information, online services might have to either give everyone better privacy protections or check your age
<b>Rule 3</b> Online services can only collect, use, or share the bare minimum amount of your personal information they need to run the app, game, or website unless you choose differently	<b>Rule 4</b> Online services need to be fair and take care of your personal information in a way that is best for you
<b>Rule 5</b> Online services need to ask for your permission to do things with your personal information	<b>Rule 6</b> If you are under 15 years-old, in some situations online services will need to involve both you and your parent or carer to get permission to change your privacy protections
<b>Rule 7</b> Online services must not trick you into giving them permission	<b>Rule 8</b> Online services must make sure that the permission they get from you (or your parent or carer) is 'good' permission
<b>Rule 9</b> Online services must make sure you can access and understand what they do with your personal information	<b>Rule 10</b> Online services must make it easy for you to ask questions and complain if there is a problem with your personal information
<b>Rule 11</b> Online services must delete your personal information if you (or your parent or carer) ask for it to be permanently deleted	<b>Rule 12</b> Online services must tell you when your physical location can be seen by other people and parental controls are being used
<b>Rule 13</b> Online services must make it easy for you to ask questions and complain if there is a problem with your personal information	<b>Rule 14</b> Online services will need to think and plan before they act

The Children's Online Privacy Code is currently a draft. We are still planning what special rules online services should have to follow, but we are showing you what we have brainstormed so far to get your feedback.

This short guide is intended to explain the main principles of the Code in an accessible way. It does not reproduce the Code's legal text, and the language has been adapted and simplified to support understanding by children. The official Exposure Draft of the Code remains the authoritative source.

## Roystonea Avenue duplication

Dear stakeholder

The Department of Logistics and Infrastructure (DLI) is duplicating Roystonea Avenue Palmerston, from Terry Drive to Lambrick Avenue. These works will improve road safety for all road users, future traffic flow and drainage.

The next stage of works requires the temporary closure of a section of Roystonea Avenue in the lanes traveling towards Lambrick Avenue between Terry Drive and Inverway Circuit.

A traffic crossover will direct traffic flow via a single lane in both directions through this section of road. These works will impact access to Inverway Circuit and Terry Drive.

Some delays to traffic flow may be expected from time-to-time during works. The department apologises for any inconvenience.

### Inverway Circuit temporary closure

As part of the project, traffic signals and pedestrian crossings will be installed at the Inverway Circuit and Roystonea Avenue intersection.

To ensure the safety of construction crew and road users, Inverway Circuit will be temporarily closed between Roystonea Avenue and Farrar Boulevard from 13 April 2026 for approximately 15 weeks (weather permitting).

Local traffic will need to detour along Farrar Boulevard to Temple Terrace or Lambrick Avenue.

### Terry Drive changed access

Due to the changed traffic conditions, there will be no right turn from Roystonea Avenue on to Terry Drive. Alternate access is via Temple Terrace or Buscall Avenue.

Additionally, there will be no right turn from Terry Drive on to Roystonea Avenue. These changes will be in place from 13 April 2026 for approximately 15 weeks (weather permitting).
